The DFCSG are now launching their latest fundraising pitch - Raising the Roof - which will enable us to complete the 250 seater stand and achieve the grading required so then we can participate in the play offs

The generosity and determination of Darlington fans never ceases to amaze me ever since that famous day back in January 2012 when you all got together to save the club - there surely can't be another group of fans anywhere in the country that will dig deep on a regular basis to help their club.

This fundraising pitch closes on 31st December, by which time all the seats that have been bought by the previous fundraising pitch, should be ready for use in the home game against York City on 6th January.

So please continue to invest in the club!

I would also like to thank everyone who mailed in questions for our netcafe a fortnight ago. It's obvious that many people care about the club and the way it is run, and I was pleased to explain some of the club's recent decisions and rationale, and the board's vision for taking the club forward. Coming to Blackwell Meadows today...

Bradford Park Avenue



Bradford Park Avenue are visiting Blackwell Meadows today, and Simon Hahn has been doing some research on them.

KEY MOMENTS IN THEIR HISTORY

Formed in 1907 and played in the Southern League - their nearest game was 130 miles away in Peterborough - and a year later joined the Second Division of the Football League

Promoted to the First Division of the English game in 1914, finishing ninth in the top flight the following season.

However, they were relegated to the Second Division in 1921, and then to the newly formed Third Division North a year later. They won that league in 1928, and stayed in the Second Division until 1950. They were relegated back to the Third Division North and then placed in the Fourth Division on the 1958 re-organisation.

They were voted out of the Football League in 1970, with Cambridge United replacing them.

Their shareholders liquidated the club in 1974, and they reformed in local Sunday League football, before switching back to Saturday football in 1988. They worked their way up the pyramid and won promotion into Conference North in 2012 where they have remained ever since.

The club has reached the quarter finals of the FA Cup on three occasions, in 1913, 1920 and 1946.

LAST SEASON

The 2016/17 season was all about survival for Bradford and they just about managed it. Despite drawing their opening three fixtures they then lost their next nine in a row including a 2-1 home defeat against ourselves. Mark Bower came in as manager after 12 games and they first tasted victory at the 16th attempt with a 3-2 win over fellow strugglers Altrincham. The win lifting them off the bottom of the table where they had been since the early stages of the campaign. Despite losing their next fixture it sparked the start of a fantastic run, as they won five out of seven. Another good run in February saw them win all three of their league games and finally move them out of the relegation zone. A further three wins in four games starting in the middle of March all but confirmed their survival and completed a quite remarkable turn out under Bower. They failed to win any of their final five games,

but it did not matter as they finished the campaign 16th in the league table.

Mark Bower - Manager

Bradford-born Mark joined the club in September 2016, taking over from Alex Meechan. The former Bradford City defender left Guiseley early last season having guided them to promotion from the then-named Conference North before miraculously retaining National League status on the last day of last season.



As a player, Bower featured over 250 times for City, and also spent time at York City, Luton Town and Guiseley before becoming manager at Nethermoor in 2013. He also played for Quakers in season 2009-10.

Adam Boyes - Striker



Avenue made a coup in the summer of 2017, beating a number of clubs to the signature of 26-year-old Adam, as he joined on a two year deal following his release by Guiseley. The forward had netted 101 goals in 335 matches at National League and National League North level prior to his move to the Horsfall Stadium, but is also well known for his hold-up play and all-round work rate. Boyes links up again once more with manager Mark Bower, who managed him as Guiseley achieved promotion to the National League, Boyes netting 24 goals in the promotion winning campaign. Starting his career at York City, the front man earned a six-figure move to Championship club Scunthorpe United

as a teenager. Spells with Kidderminster, Barrow and Gateshead followed before Bower took Boyes to Guiseley in January 2013.

Nicky Wroe - Midfielder

Experienced midfielder Nicky joined the club in July 2016 from neighbours FC Halifax Town, and won last season's Player of the Year award following a string of fine performances in green and white. The 31-year-old arrived with a wealth of experience and well over 200 appearances in the Football League. He started his career at Barnslev, and featured for Bury. Hamilton Academical and York City before joining Torquay United in 2008. He won promotion from the Conference in his first season at Plainmoor, and made over 100 appearances in three years at the club before joining Shrewsbury Town for an undisclosed fee. He moved on again in 2012, joining League One side Preston North End, but ended his second season with loan spells at Shrewsbury and Oxford before joining Notts County in 2014. Last season he joined Halifax on loan before making the switch permanent in January, going on to captain the Shaymen to victory in the FA Trophy final at Wembley.

Adam Nowakowski - Midfielder

Versatile Adam joined the club in October 2016, initially on loan from Quakers, before making the move permanent just before Christmas. The towering utility man can play in the centre of midfield, defence or even operate as a striker. Prior to joining us in 2015 Nowakowski had spent his whole senior career at Harrogate Town, where he made well over 100 appearances at National League North level. He came through the ranks



at Leeds United, where he progressed as a right winger before his height and strength saw him converted into an enforcer at Wetherby Road. A box-to-box midfielder, Nowakowski is strong in the tackle and is capable of chipping in with the odd goal as well, as he did against Kidderminster in their last league game.

LAST MATCH

Bradford PA 1-1 Kidderminster Harriers

The visitors dictated the tempo in the early stages of the match and appeared most likely to break the deadlock. James McQuilkin threaded an exquisite pass through to Emmanuel Sonupe for Harriers whose shot went just inches wide.

Despite the early pressure it was Park Avenue who took the lead. Ryan Toulson found space on the right flank, before squaring the ball across the six yard box for Adam Nowakowski to bundle home.

Moments later, the home side came close to doubling their advantage, Nowakowski's drilled effort appeared to strike the arm of a Kidderminster defender, but nothing was given.

Mark Bower's side were forced to swallow another bitter pill just minutes later, with half-time looming. Joe Ironside cut in from the left to deliver the ball on a plate for Sonupe, who maintained his composure to level.

Teenage substitute Harvey Saunders put Darlington into joint third place with a late goal.

Quakers looked as if they would be frustrated by a spirited Bradford side until Saunders, who had only been on the field for two minutes, scored the winner.

Quakers nearly scored on 11 minutes when Josh Falkingham found the overlapping Josh Gillies down the left with a great ball. Gillies crossed first time into the middle where David Syers headed against the angle of post and crossbar.

Quakers hit the post again on 51 minutes. This time, David Ferguson crossed deep from the left for Mark Beck, standing on the edge of the box, to volley left footed first time against the left hand post.

There was another chance for Quakers when Beck and Syers caused problems in the Bradford box and the ball dropped for sub Nathan Cartman who dragged his shot wide.

But Quakers had to be careful about the Bradford counter attack, and sub Oli Johnson created space well for himself and hit a powerful right foot shot that Adam Bartlett pushed around the post with a flying save.

Quakers had a let off when Terry Galbraith slipped and let Nicky Wroe through, and as Bartlett came out, Wroe tried to play the ball inside instead of shooting, and Liam Marrs intercepted and got the ball away.

Marrs was replaced soon after, with Saunders coming on, Quakers going with four up front. The tactic paid off, Stephen Thompson won the ball in midfield, put the ball in the box, and after Beck had a shot cleared off the line, Saunders fired the ball home.

Overall, Quakers and Bradford have played each other 46 times in the past, Quakers winning 20 and Bradford 18.

The first time we played Bradford was in our FA Cup run of 1910/11 when we won 2-1 and our last meeting in the Football League was in 1969-70, just before Bradford were sadly voted out of the league.

BRADFORD PARK AVENUE THE UNLIKELY LADS



Football historian LEIGH EDWARDS profiles ten big-name Bradford Park Avenue players not usually associated with the club



LEN SHACKLETON

Skilful inside-forward Len Shackleton was capped five times by England after leaving Bradford Park Avenue. A former Arsenal amateur, he joined Bradford Park Avenue in December 1940 and created a big reputation in wartime football. The 'Clown Prince of Soccer' netted four goals in seven post-war Second Division games, moving to Newcastle United for £13.000 in October 1946. Scoring six times on his debut, he joined Sunderland for a then record £20,050 in February 1948 and starred as they were twice FA Cup semi-finalists. His career was curtailed by injury in September 1957 and he later became a journalist. He died in Cumbria in November 2000

RON GREENWOOD

England B international centre-half Ron Greenwood achieved managerial success



after leaving Bradford Park Avenue. He ioined Avenue from Chelsea in December 1945 and made 59 Second Division appearances before moving to Brentford in March 1949. then rejoined Chelsea. Helping win the League Championship in 1954-55, he had a spell at Fulham prior to coaching Walthamstow. Arsenal and England U-23s. Appointed West Ham's boss in April 1961, he plotted their 1964 FA Cup final success and 1965 ECWC final triumph, becoming their general manager. He then managed England from December 1977 until July 1982 and died in February 2006.

DEREK KEVAN

Inside-left Derek Kevan was capped 14 times by England after leaving Bradford Park Avenue. Initially with Ripon YMCA, he joined Bradford in October 1952 and netted eight goals in 15 League

games before following Vic Buckingham to West Brom in July 1953. 'The Tank' was twice ever-present and topped their goalscoring charts on five occasions. moving to Chelsea in March 1963. Later playing for Manchester City. Crystal Palace, Peterborough United, Luton Town, Stockport County. Macclesfield Town, Boston United and Stourbridge, he was a chargehand for Ansells brewerv. then a driver for Signs Specialists in Hockley. He died in January 2013.

IAN GIBSON

Midfielder Ian Gibson gained Scotland U-23 honours after leaving Bradford Park Avenue. Initially with Accrington Stanley, he joined Bradford in July 1959 and helped win promotion in 1960-61. netting 18 goals in 88 League games before moving to Middlesbrough for £20.000 in March 1962. He joined Coventry City for £57.500 in July 1966 and starred in their 1966-67 Second Division title triumph, reuniting with Jimmy Scoular at Cardiff City for £35,000 in July 1970. Moving to AFC Bournemouth in a joint £100.000 deal with Brian Clark in October 1972, he later had spells with

Berrea Park, Gateshead and Whitby Town. He died in May 2016.

JIMMY SCOULAR

Former Scotland international wing-half Jimmy Scoular managed Bradford Park Avenue's 1960-61 promotion success. Signing professional for Portsmouth in December 1945, he helped them win two consecutive League Championships and moved to Newcastle United in June 1954. He captained their 1955 FA Cup final triumph. becoming Bradford Park Avenue's player-boss in January 1961. Scoring five goals in 108 League games, he was appointed Cardiff City's manager in June 1964. He led them to seven Welsh Cup final successes and the ECWC semi-finals in 1967-68. Later managing Newport County, he then scouted until his death in March 1998

KEVIN HECTOR

Striker Kevin Hector was capped twice by England after leaving Bradford Park Avenue. Signing professional for Avenue in July 1962, he was top scorer on four occasions and netted 113 goals in 176 League games before moving to Derby County for £40,000 in September 1966. Starring as they won the Second Division title in 1968-69, then the League Championship in 1971-72 and 1974-75, he was leading marksman five times. He returned from a spell at Vancouver Whitecaps to set the Rams' appearance record. Moving to Gresley Rovers in September 1982, he later played for Burton Albion. Gresley again, Belper Town, Eastwood Town and Heanor.

MICK McGRATH

Republic of Ireland international central defender Mick McGrath gained the last four of his 22 caps while at Bradford Park Avenue. Starting with Home Farm, he joined Blackburn Rovers in August 1954 and was ever-present as they regained top-flight status and were FA Cup semifinalists in 1957-58. He was an FA Cup finalist in 1960 and represented the Football League, helping Rovers to reach the League Cup semifinals in 1961-62. Moving to Bradford in March 1966, he had a spell as captain and scored twice in 50 League games for Park Avenue. becoming Bangor City's player-boss. He later coached Rovers' vouth team and settled in Blackburn.

KENNY HIBBITT Midfielder

Kenny Hibbitt

gained England U-23 honours after leaving Bradford Park Avenue. Bradford born, and the younger brother of Terry Hibbitt, he made 15 League appearances for Avenue, moving to Wolves in November 1968. He was a UEFA Cup finalist in 1972, then helped them to win the League Cup twice and Second Division title in 1976-77. Reuniting with Bobby Gould at Coventry City in August 1984, he followed him to Bristol Rovers in August 1986 where injury ended his career in February 1988. He joined their coaching staff, then managed Walsall.

Cardiff City and Hednesford Town and became a Premier League referees' assessor.

RAY CHARNLEY

England international centre-forward Ray Charnley ended his League career with Bradford Park Avenue. Initially with Bolton-le-Sands, he joined Morecambe in September 1954 and moved to Blackpool in May 1957. He starred as they took Luton Town to an FA Cup sixth round replay in 1958-59 and were League Cup semifinalists in 1961-62. Leading scorer on seven occasions, he ioined Preston in December 1967. He moved via Wrexham to Bradford in January 1969, scoring 15 goals in 59 League games while at Park Avenue, then reioined Morecambe in June 1970. Later a painter and decorator in Blackpool. he died in November 2009.

MEL HOPKINS

Former Welsh international left-back Mel Hopkins was capped 34 times before joining Bradford Park Avenue. He turned professional with Tottenham Hotspur in May 1952 and made his international debut in April 1956. Featuring in the 1958 World Cup, he was a member of Spurs' 1960-61 'Double' squad and made over 200 First Division appearances prior to ioinina Brighton in October 1964. He helped win the Fourth Division title that season, then had spells with Ballymena and Canterbury City. Moving to Bradford in January 1969, he made 30 League appearances while at Park Avenue. He was later a sports officer and died in Worthing in October 2010.

WAS fortunate to be at the recent Soccerex conference in Manchester where Non-League football came under the spotlight in a session featuring club chairmen and renowned Spanish football journalist Guillem Balague.

The timing of such a panel discussion was appropriate, for the much-publicised events at Billericay Town have commanded considerable attention and provided plenty of talking points. Billericay for the Football League? We have seen very bold ambitions coming from Non-League clubs in the past, notably in Essex where "crash and burn" stories are not uncommon – witness the tale of Gravs Athletic.

Can a club of the size of Billericay reach and sustain a place in the Football League? There are reasons why a certain size of club does not naturally climb to that level, and many have found their natural home long ago. More often than not, that status will not change dramatically unless there is the sort of inflated investment that propels a club sky high. In some ways, it's no different to the big-time, where perpetual under-achievers Chelsea and Manchester City were suddenly thrust forward because of a massive shift in the financial structure of the club.

When the Football League was created in 1888, it was on the back of the industrial revolution with the clubs coming from Lancashire and the Midlands. The game was the recreation of the mill towns of the north and central England, so there was a certain logic in professionalism taking root amid the smoking

chimneys and factories.

Most became large towns and cities and generally, the pecking order in football has belonged to locations with sizeable populations, hence clubs like Manchester United and Liverpool have been "big" for decades. There are some remarkable exceptions, but there is some correlation between population and football success.

For football clubs to flourish, you [invariably] need critical mass, in terms of people who are interested in the club, and money. Some clubs have one or the other, but the real giants of the sport have both. You could also make a case that one needs the other, unless inflated investment creates a lop-sided model that can rarely go beyond the short-term. Unless you are an Oligarch, an oil-man or, in today's environment, from China, throwing in huge sums of money cannot be sustained.

If you look at the more recent Football League new boys, there are clubs from relatively small towns that have worked their way up the ladder - Fleetwood (26,000), Morecambe (35,000) and of course, the most curious case in Forest Green Rovers (8,000). Others such as Stevenage (88,000), Crawley (110,000), Cheltenham (117,000), Wycombe (124,000) and Accrington (55,000) play more to the theory that big towns equal bigger clubs.

Billericay has a population of 28,000 and is, essentially, a town of commuters, many of whom will have allegiances to London clubs. It's a nice, aspirational town whose football club has enjoyed success in the past, especially in the 1970s when the FA Vase was won three times.

Automatic promotion has undoubtedly been good for ambitious clubs and a succession of new Football League members have been created since 1987 when Scarborough replaced Lincoln City. Not all have lasted the distance, but Non-League, over the past 50 years, has provided some wonderful moments for the Football League. Since 1967-68, the League has lost clubs like Wrexham. Aldershot, Workington, Barrow. York, Bradford Park Avenue, Torquay, Tranmere and Leyton Orient. At the same time, Non-League clubs like Barnet. Wigan, Cambridge United and Morecambe have all risen through the ranks. So the landscape can change and the amount of churn in the Football League proves that clubs can rise and fall. The question is, how should that be achieved organically or artificially?

If, as pointed out at Soccerex, Non-League is "the essence of football", then surely creating something "artificial" goes against the grain? As we have seen in Europe this summer, paying vast sums of money for a player can trigger off a spiral that makes football even more of an unrealistic financial model than it currently is.

Some Non-League clubs are already paying far too much money to their players. The danger is that in pursuit of "the dream", a dangerous precedent could be set and the economics of Non-League football could be blown out of all proportion, and that would surely create more "crash and burn".

Windscale took an early lead with a good goal, but Quakers equalised with a good header by James Beauchamp.



League leaders Harrogate Town saw their four-match winning run ended last weekend, in a surprising 2-1 home reverse in the FA Cup to Gainsborough Trinity.

Salford City slipped three points off the pace a fortnight ago with a 3-2 defeat against struggling Learnington. It was the Ammies' first defeat since the start of the season.

Third-placed Blyth Spartans made it six wins from their last seven league games with a 3-1 victory at Stockport. Late goals from Michael Liddle and Jarrett Rivers kept up Spartans' good form.

A second half collapse from Spennymoor last weekend against Curzon Ashton ended a run of three straight wins. Moors went down 4-2.

Fifth-placed Brackley, who are a point behind Spennymoor, were knocked out of the FA Cup by Isthmian League side Billericay in midweek.

York City were pegged back at a resurgent Leamington last weekend, with the Midlands side scoring twice late on to earn a 2-2 draw.

After five wins from their last six league games, Chorley took their good form into the FA Cup, winning 4-3 at Boston in a replay to set up a first round tie at home to League One Fleetwood.

Back-to-back defeats to FC United and Gainsborough have seen Tamworth drop out of the play-offs.

After a slow start to the season, Curzon Ashton have moved within a point of the play-off places after losing just one of their last eight.

Today's opponents Bradford PA, led by former Quaker Mark Bower, are a point further back after one defeat in nine league games.

Last week's defeat to Blyth means Stockport have taken just four points from their last five games with the Hatters three points off the play-offs.

13th-placed Kidderminster sit below Darlington on goal difference and made the FA Cup 1st round by knocking out National League Premier side Chester.

Remarkably, AFC Telford have alternated between victory and defeat for their last 10 league matches. After winning their last league game, does that mean they're heading for defeat against North Ferriby today?

Alfreton may be eight positions below the play-off spots, but they're just four points adrift. Alfreton have taken only one point from their last three games.

Southport are in freefall after losing five games in a row, and six of their last seven (their only victory coming against Darlington).

Two wins in their last three have helped move Nuneaton four points clear of the drop zone

Leamington's form has markedly improved in recent weeks, with the Midlands side unbeaten in their last five, with all those results coming against sides in the top half.

Boston have dropped to within one place and one point of the relegation zone after taking only a point from their last four games.

FC United ended a run of four straight defeats with victory over Tamworth three weeks ago. They followed that up with an entertaining 3-3 draw against bottom club North Ferriby.

Gainsborough Trinity moved within a point of safety after beating Tamworth a fortnight ago - their first win in six league games.

And continuing to prop up the division are North Ferriby, without a win in nine matches in all competitions and with only one league win all season.

Amar took over in goal after Adam McHugh was dismissed for a foul and then arguing with the referee following a penalty award. He had no chance with the penalty – which was taken by another former Darlo player Nathan Mulligan – and he had no chance again with a late equaliser.

McHugh's subsequent suspension, and an injury to West's other keeper – former Darlo player **Craig Turns** – saw them sign **Mark Bell** in time for their 3-O away win at West Alloment last Saturday.

James Walshaw scored twice as Farsley Celtic beat Nantwich Town 2-0 in the EvoStik Premier on 7th October. Liam Hardy scored the winning goal for Buxton against Marine in the EvoStik Premier on 7th October, his 68th goal for the club in his two spells there.

Paul Weldon, who was part of our squad in the EvoStik Premier winning season, is now at Newton Aycliffe, and he scored the winner for them in their 2-1 home win over Ryhope CW a fortnight ago.

In the latest of his Memory Match series, Simon Weatherill remembers the 3-0 away win at Hull City on 25th October 1947.

1947/48 was the second season of League Football after the Second World War. Darlington had finished the previous season, 1946/47, in 17th place in the Division Three North table and were looking to improve. They would have to do so with basically the same squad of players though as manager Bill Forrest had only made one significant signing during the summer, bringing in left winger Cliff Chadwick from Hull City.

The club made an inconsistent start to the 47/48 season. Their first four home games resulted in one draw and three defeats, and it was October 18th before they registered a home win, 3-1 against Accrington Stanley. Away from Feethams was a much happier story. Wins at Gateshead. York and Tranmere and a draw at Chester kept the Quakers safely away from the scrap at the foot of the table. By the time they visited Hull City on October 25th they were positioned 17th in the table with 10 points from their 12 games so far. Their opponents, Hull City, sat proudly on top of the table with 18 points from 13 games. Their excellent defensive record had taken them to the top on goal average - City only having conceded nine goals in the season so far. They were sure to provide stiff

opposition as they were in a great run of form, 7 games unbeaten with 13 goals scored and two conceded.

City had won their latest game 1-0 at Gateshead on the previous Saturday and would make one change to their starting eleven to face the Quakers. New signing Jim Bloxham, signed from Atherton Colliery on the Friday, would make his debut on the right wing in place of Martin Reagan, Left winger Alan Daley had been doubtful due to an injury picked up at Gateshead but was fit to play. Darlington stuck with the same eleven that had beaten Accrington a week earlier. First choice full back John Eves was still unavailable with a septic toe, so Tom Kelly would continue at right back, with Robert Dodds deputising for Kelly at right half. Left winger Cliff Chadwick would be facing his old team mates.

An impressive crowd of 26,240 turned out at Boothferry Park, keen to see Hull City continue their good run and extend their lead at the top of the table, in what should be a comfortable home win for the league leaders. As expected, City made a strong start, but the Quakers defence stood firm. Their only early scare came when a clever pass by George Richardson played in Norman Moore, but he

shot wide, across the goal. Darlington hit back and after a good run and cross by Jack Saunders. Tom Varty headed against the angle of upright and crossbar. Moments later, Varty went close again when he cut through the home defence and fired in a shot that brought City keeper Peter Atkinson to his knees. It was end to end stuff and Ouakers' Ken Bower went close when he beat two defenders and fired in a shot that deflected for a corner off Atkinson's body as the keeper threw himself at the onrushing centre forward. The Quakers were now starting to take control of the game and put the home defence under severe pressure. Chadwick fired in a shot from out wide that was comfortably saved by Atkinson, then Dodds put in a fierce drive that went only just wide of the post. The Hull goal had another narrow escape when Chadwick nearly intercepted a back pass by Norman Fowler, but the home keeper just beat him to the ball and cleared. Robert Sinclair had the next possible chance from long range, but shot high over the

Darlington eventually grabbed the lead that their enterprising play deserved after 35 minutes. Play progressed down the left wing as Varty played in





Chadwick who crossed into the box. Ken Bower beat Atkinson to the ball at the far post and cleverly worked it around the keeper and turned it into the net. Hull stormed back and Norman Tapken, in the Darlington goal, had his most serious work of the afternoon as he saved first from Berry and then Richardson. The Quakers had an injury scare at the end of the first half as Chadwick suffered a heavy challenge and had to be carried from the field. Half time - Hull City O Darlington 1.

The Darlington supporters in the crowd were relieved to see Chadwick resume in the second half in his usual position. With the wind at their backs, the Quakers were soon on the attack again. Bower had a shot blocked, then Varty put in a cross shot that flew just over the bar. Hull offered

very little in attack and the Darlington defence had little difficulty in checking their efforts. On 71 minutes, the Ouakers increased their lead. Chadwick took the ball down the left wing and centred to Sinclair, who fired in a shot that was blocked by Atkinson. The ball rebounded to Bower who drove it home for goal number two. Two minutes later Varty headed home brilliantly from a Sinclair cross to put the result beyond any doubt. The league leaders had been well beaten on their own ground and could have no complaints about the

The unexpected 3-0 victory lifted the Quakers up to 14th

place in the table. They had now secured nine points from their first eight away games – already one more point than they had gained away from home in the whole of the previous season. The Quakers eventually finished the season in 16th place with 39 points from their 42 games, one place higher and three points better off than the previous year.

Hull City produced a 12 page programme for the 47/48 season, priced at 3d. The team line ups were on the centre pages.

Fundraising Update - Seating Phase 2 of 3

Many thanks indeed for all your pledges towards the procurement of the additional seats. The offer closed at the end of last month and the fantastic news is that we managed to hit the target of £38,300 just ahead of deadline with a few 11th hour pledges! This continued the amazing achievement of the fans hitting every single fundraising target which has been put before them.

The Football Club has placed the order for the seats and if everything goes to plan, they should be installed in time for the match against York City on Saturday 6 January 2018. Although initially the seats will be without a roof they will still improve the matchday experience at Blackwell Meadows.

So now we move on to the next phase of fundraising. This time we need £50.000 by 31 December to 'Raise the Roof. However, by hitting the Community Share target for the seats means that the sum collected via the Ground Development fund (currently £6.201) can be rolled forwards towards this target. REMINDER OF DARLINGTON FOOTBALL CLUB'S

GROUND REGULATIONS



In home games last season, there were incidents involving a flare, some coin throwing and fans encroaching on to the field of play. Accordingly, we have been requested to remind fans about our ground regulations.

These regrettable incidents are contrary to our ground regulations, as published on our official website on 12th October last year, and again last week.

The pertinent regulations are as follows:

"The following articles must not be brought within the Ground – knives, fireworks or any other pyrotechnics, smoke canisters, air-horns, flares, weapons, dangerous or hazardous items, laser devices, glass bottles, glass vessels, cans, poles, any articles that are prohibited by the Rules and Regulations, and any article that might be used as a weapon and/or compromise public safety. Any person in possession of such items will be refused entry to (or ejected from) the Ground."

And

"Under the Football (Offences) Act 1991 (as amended) the following are offences for which a person can be arrested by a police officer and conviction could result in a Banning Order being made under the Football Spectators Act 1989 (as amended): The list is non-exhaustive.

"The throwing of any object within the Ground without lawful authority or excuse:

"The entry onto the playing area or any adjacent area to which spectators are not generally admitted without lawful authority or excuse."

We should be very clear. Those responsible for such incidents simply do not care about our club, our reputation or the safety of our fans and we do not want them at our matches. The club will work with the stewards and police to ensure that these matters are addressed and the individuals will be banned from future matches.

Ensuring the safety of our supporters and staff is always of paramount importance to Darlington FC 1883. If such behaviour was to continue, the reality is it would only be a matter of time before serious injury is caused and the club in turn would be punished by the league and/or the FA. We will not allow safety to be compromised of the well-behaved and sensible majority by the actions of a tiny minority.

We would also like to draw attention to the possession of pyrotechnics

As a member Club participating in The National League we have been directed to take the strongest action available against anyone found in possession of a Flare. Smoke Bomb or any other such pyrotechnic article(s).

Spectators are warned that we and The National League apply a zero tolerance approach to anyone attempting to bring such article(s) into our Ground/Stadium.

Due to their chemical makeup, a Flare, Smoke Bomb and all such pyrotechnic article(s) can be highly toxic for some people. This can lead to serious health consequences for those with pre-existing medical conditions and may in certain circumstances cause lifethreatening injury or concern.

In order to protect you, the spectator, we reserve the right to search your person and/or effects and we further reserve the right to pursue legal action, civil or criminal, against any person who contravenes current legislation or our Ground/ Stadium regulations.

To further safeguard all who attend any event at this Ground/ Stadium, we welcome the receipt of any information which will assist us to deter, apprehend/detain and where appropriate prosecute, anyone in possession of; or found discharging or being a party to the discharge of, such an article(s).


