LAST MATCH: WREXHAM 0 HARROGATE TOWN 2 FA TROPHY FIRST ROUND

Former Quaker Mark Beck scored his first two goals for his new club, as Harrogate recorded an impressive win at National League Wrexham to seal their place in the FA Trophy Second Round. Harrogate started on top with Beck coming close twice to opening the scoring. Wrexham's first opportunity arrived just after the half hour mark as Scott Boden flicked a header towards goal, but goalkeeper James Belshaw saved well.

Just minutes before half time Beck gave Town the lead as he guided George Thomson's floated cross into the net with a well placed header. Terry Kennedy almost doubled Harrogate's lead just after the break, but Wrexham keeper Christian Dibble turned his effort round the post. However, they did double their lead on 69 minutes when Beck grabbed his second again with his head at the back post from Rvan Fallowfield's cross.

Wrexham tried to find a way back into the game, but the closest they came was through Cameron McGregor whose snapshot hit the inside of the post. Harrogate held on though to claim a very impressive victory over a side a league higher then themselves. They will now play St Albans in the second round.

Castron

Top scorer - Simon Ainge

Simon Ainge joined Town from Yorkshire rivals Bradford Park Avenue in the summer of 2016, and has made a big impact so far at The CNG Stadium. Ainge was placed straight into the heart of Town's defence and has captained the side on multiple occasions, though it was his switch further up the pitch towards the end of the year that really caught the eye. 19 goals since the turn of the year, including four against Alfreton and hat-trick against National League North Winners AFC Fylde saw Ainge finish the season as top-scorer with 24 goals. The former Bradford City man was even

named the league's Player of the Month in February before committing his future to the club, signing a two-year deal in May.



Ex-Quaker - Josh Falkingham

Josh Falkingham started his footballing career with Leeds United at the age of eight before joining Scottish Premier League side St Johnstone after 11 years at his hometown club.

The central midfielder with an eye for goal, then spent time north of the border at The Saints, Arbroath and Dunfermline Athletic, whom he captained and helped gain promotion to the Scottish Championship.


Falkingham came back to England with ourselves under Martin Gray, before moving to Harrogate in the summer. The prospect of returning to full time football as well as the opportunity for the UEFA 'B' Licence holder to take charge of the U21 side ensured Falkingham would be plying his trade at The CNG Stadium.

Mark Beck

Striker Mark Beck joined Harrogate Town from ourselves in November 2017 for an undisclosed fee. The six-foot-five forward was our top scorer in the 2016/17 season and played a huge part in our campaign that saw us miss out on the playoffs only due to regulations. Beck started his career at Carlisle United, before having spells at Falkirk, Yeovil Town and Wrexham.



Harrogate had a fantastic start to last season only losing one of their first 12 games winning eight of these fixtures including a 1-0 win away at eventual promoted side Halifax. However, their form rapidly declined as they faced the other top sides in the division. They would go on to lose eight of their next ten games as they slipped out of the playoff places. After the turn of the year they managed to turn their results around, but too many draws left them an uphill battle to make the top five. Any slim chance they had of making the playoffs in the final months disappeared as they lost five games out of six including fixtures with playoff rivals Kidderminster and Halifax. They finished the campaign in 11th place. However, turning full-time in the summer has seen them reap the benefits, as they have had a great start to this campaign so far.

Building the future together

Good afternoon everybody and a very Happy Christmas to you all!

December has been a very frustrating month for everyone at the club and it's great to finally return to home league action today against Harrogate Town who are flying high in the table and pushing for automatic promotion. It is also good to welcome back Mark Beck who served the club well and was fantastic in his time here, but I hope he is very quiet today! Incidentally, we will also travel to Harrogate on New Year's Day for the return fixture so given our recent cup tie together both clubs will have a very clear understanding of each other by the end of the holiday period!

The recent weather has obviously disrupted Tommy's plans in recent weeks with the games being called off due to an unplayable pitch, despite the best efforts of ground staff and fans to try and get the pitch into an acceptable condition. Unfortunately the frosts were so deep that this proved unsuccessful. As I write, we are hopeful that the first team will have had a run out against Middlesbrough U23 side to get some much needed match fitness into them before the busy Christmas period. Many thanks to Middlesbrough and Craig Liddle in particular for supporting us with this fixture; it is a tremendous gesture and is hopefully the start of a closer relationship between our clubs moving forwards.

The cancellation of games also brings with it other pressures such as cash flow, whereby we have not had any gate income since our FA Trophy game with Harrogate on the 24th November. Obviously we have wages and other bills to pay so the Middlesbrough game and the matches over Christmas are important for us to replenish cash reserves through hopefully some high attendances.

During December I took the opportunity to outline the Boards' (both DFC and DFCSG) views and thoughts as to how we approach the future. The emergence of the Darlington Sporting Village proposal however, has generated interest as to the re-development of the Arena and the surrounding land. At this stage, it is a vision and

the next step is to produce a detailed business plan to identify the commercial deliverability of the plan. This will involve meetings with all of the stakeholders and DFC will be involved in those discussions to ensure our requirements are clearly understood.

By the start of next season we will, however, have a ground at Blackwell Meadows that we have developed through our fans' fundraising to enable us to play in the National League. This is a tremendous achievement and you should be proud of your efforts in this project. The above Sporting Village proposal however does bring some confusion and uncertainty as to where and how the Council will allow future sporting development and as such I believe it is prudent to place on hold any further investment into the ground until these plans are known. The club will however continue to look for fund raising throughout next season, as we clearly want to start creating a surplus to support the development of income-generating assets that will provide a sustainable financial future. This will enable us to move quickly once the wider development plans are known. I would anticipate that these plans will be much clearer in the next six to nine months.

The key priorities for the club in the New Year are therefore to engage with all of the stakeholders to ensure our requirements are understood, support the short term cash flow to clear off the legacy debt and return to winning ways on the football field. I am confident we will deliver on all three fronts!

Finally, can I welcome the directors, officials, players and fans of Harrogate to the club and wish them a safe return journey after the match.

Enjoy the game and get behind the team!

Darlington FC - a sustainable future

Darlington chief executive officer David Johnston gave a very interesting presentation at the Dolphin Centre about building a sustainable future for the club.

After David's presentation in the Dolphin Centre, he and Chris Stockdale from the DFCSG, held a netcafe to answer questions sent in by fans. They were inundated! Here's a summarised selection of questions and answers.

One of the main points in David's presentation was about acquiring assets that can generate revenue for the club.

John Dunn asked: "I understand DJ wants to create assets that can bring money into the club. That is obviously extremely sensible.

"I think that he also suggested that a 3G pitch would cost ~£400k-£500k to install but would generate £700k per annum. If that is anywhere near right, then even allowing for additional running costs in administering the pitch business and maintaining it that is an astonishingly good return. Are there any plans to put a business plan / case together to justify the financing of exactly this project?"

David's reply: "I looked at 3G/4G pitches several years ago when I was watching "Goal" share prices (they had 42 pitches across the country at that time) and on investigation quickly realised these assets are both

profitable and importantly cash generative. Your figures are slightly out but we would have to re-run my old financial models to determine what the cost would be - a pitch is relatively straight forward but would be c£450-500k but I would also like to include a clubhouse with bar facilities. space for our future Academy requirements, together with changing rooms and office space to make it our home. This would obviously increase the costs but the net profit that could be generated from a fully operational pitch is a significant sum that would resolve all of our cash flow issues for the foreseeable future and should remove the need for the continual fan contributions.

Naturally we would have to get planning and there is also the issue regarding supply/ demand in relation to pitch supply in the Darlington area. This will also affect profitability, so we would need to produce a detailed business plan and get approval once our preferred location is known."

David also suggested a monthly direct debit scheme for supporters to help raise cash for the club.

lain Weaver asked: "With regards to the DD idea of £40 per month - £480 per year – this could be seen as a huge sum on top of the price of a season ticket / regular match day tickets.

"Would it be an idea to look to incorporate a standard standing season ticket for each contributor if you donate this amount with money off a season ticket if you donate less than that figure e.g. donate £360 per year you get £120 off your season ticket. donate £420 you get £180 off your season ticket. I'm basing this on a standard season being around £240 per year. That way you'd be ensuring vou get an extra £240 per person who takes up the scheme. I know it isn't the projected £480 but it may be more achievable.

"Another way of spreading the income throughout the year is to have a pay per month season ticket rather than everyone having to pay the full amount in one go. It may make the uptake of season tickets greater if you could spread the cost through the year"

David's reply: "Thanks for your suggestion, it is certainly something we can look at. One of the clear things to remember however is that the club needs not only the match day revenue we are currently getting but also the additional sums the fans raise through boost the budget, bucket collections, community pledges etc. We need to be careful that the schemes generated are not substitutional for the current income...any scheme we introduce must generate additional revenue. I will however take this idea forward Almost 200 fans turned up at the Dolphin Centre to hear a presentation by David Johnston.

to the Boards as your idea is worth discussing further."

Steve Bishop wondered if the club would become part of the proposed Sports Hub at the Arena.

"What's your view on the potential 'Sports Hub' at The Arena, could this be an opportunity to take the club to the next level? Are we actively looking at the opportunity of bringing a local private investor on board, who could build the club in collaboration with the fans?"

David replied: "The Sports Hub project, whilst being a very bold vision, clearly needs a supporting business plan showing all of the financial models before I can comment on its suitability for DFC.

"If we deal with the vision first; the concept of a sporting village within the town is clearly a good idea, regenerating the area and creating employment and opportunity and as the largest sporting club in Darlington it would make sense that we have a presence there.

The business plan however is currently not available and until I can see what the financial implications are for DFC, I will not jeopardise the future of our club unless the commercial deal is beneficial for us. Any move to the village would need to enable us to create our own income generating assets that I mentioned on Monday

evening and we would also need to understand clearly what the plans are for a ground.

"If the plans assume we are playing in the Arena, there are certain pre-requisites -- our league rules insist that we have primacy of tenure, and that the proposal for the Arena is for a plastic pitch - we cannot relocate on this assumption as whilst that would be ok for the National League, the current FA League requirements do not allow league games to be played on plastic.


"In its current form, the Arena in my opinion is not really fit for purpose. The fan experience with 2,000 fans in a 25,000 capacity stadium is not ideal and there is ageing infrastructure that could result in increasing operational costs. We will however have to wait for the plans to be developed and ensure that our requirements are clearly understood if there is to be any further development or re-development.

"In relation to your second question, the club is always open to any proposal concerning investment, but the current club structure prohibits any individual from obtaining more than 15% of the equity. Following the problems of recent years, the articles and rules were created to protect the club from falling into any one

individual's hands and thus the fan owned model was developed.

Therein lies an immediate conflict as I am assuming that any individual who wanted to invest significantly into the club would want a serious say if not control over how the club was run on a daily basis. This is currently not permitted.

"If, however, the Boards did decide that external investment coming in was in the interests of the club, the fans would have to vote to accept that, so it is a very complex position. Needless to say, we are not inundated with offers either, so this is the driving reason behind our approach to develop income generating assets that make the club both self-sufficient and financially sustainable."

Kevan Smith and **Mark Prudhoe**

Our new keeper, James Talbot, isn't the first that we've signed from Sunderland in the last thirty years.

The last keeper we brought in from the Black Cats was Jordan Pickford, whom Craig Liddle brought to the club in January 2012 when we were going through that infamous administration.

Pickford was aged 17 when he made his debut for us in that fundraising appeal game against Fleetwood on January 21st, 2012, when 5,638 fans saw us lose 1-0.

Pickford went on to make 17 league appearances for us - a very important contribution -- as we survived the season. It can't have done him any harm - four years later, he made his first team debut against Arsenal, and in June 2017 he was transferred to Everton for £25 million. He made his England debut against Germany last month.

Mark Prudhoe was our keeper in two glorious title winning years - the GM Vauxhall Conference in 1990 and the Fourth Division in 1991. He started his career at Sunderland, making seven appearances for them, before going to Birmingham, Walsall and Carlisle (amongst others) before Brian little signed him on 1989.


He played over 150 games for us, before he moved to Stoke City when Billy McEwan was Darlington manager, in 1993. He played for a few more clubs before he had a brief loan spell with us in 1999 when David Hodgson was manager.

He's now goalkeeping coach at Sunderland, so watch out for him attending a few Darlo matches.

David Preece was a young pro at Sunderland without making a first team appearance, and he joined us at the start of 1997-98 season.



He made 106 appearances for us in two seasons, before he went to Aberdeen in 1999. He was our keeper on that famous night when we came back from two goals down to beat Burnley 3-2 in the FA cup first round at the Riverside.



Darlington's new signing Greg Mills admits that he would have packed in football if it wasn't for Tommy Wright - he spoke to Ray Simpson.

Greg started his football career as a twelve-year-old at Derby County, and worked his way up to the first team until making two first team appearances. "I played through all of the age groups, and got into the first team squad. I had four managers! It was Nigel Clough who gave me my debut, just down the road from Darlington at Middlesbrough, and I made my other appearance against Ipswich. I was involved with the first team from the age of 17, all the way through until I got released.

"I had just been tipped to push on in the first team and make more appearances, when I injured my Achilles, and I was out for six months. I fell down the pecking order as new people came in. I went out on loan to Telford, played a few games for them, and then I was released by Derby at the age of 25.

"I joined Telford on a permanent basis. I got in the division's team of the year when Telford were promoted from the Conference North to Conference Premier and when we were promoted. I played against Darlington in the Conference Premier. We were a part time team in a full-time league, and we did all right. But we were a young team, and the manager at the time wanted to bring in some experienced players, and I got phased out. I was either a sub or not even in the squad.

"I was used to playing week in and week out, so I went to Worcester. I had a few more clubs after that, and it got to the point where I wasn't taking football seriously. I played for clubs as far apart as Barrow and King's Lynn, for example, hoping that I would find the right place that suited me.

"But none of them did. I'm not going to lie, I fell out of love with football for six months, then Tommy called me on the recommendation of a team mate at the time, and he persuaded me to come back and enjoy my football. He thought that we would be a good fit, and he turned out to be right!"

Tommy was manager of Corby then, and building a team that would win the Southern League, and win promotion to Conference North.

"My record under Tommy goals-wise was ridiculous. I scored regularly under Tommy at Corby -- and that was playing as a winger. You would have to ask him how he managed it, but he got the best out of me at that time. I scored one in two games when I was at Corby, and then one in three under him at Nuneaton. I was third top scorer with 23 in the Southern League when I was at Corby and won promotion, and then the following season in Conference North, I scored 19 - and we were relegated. I scored nearly half our goals that season.

"Tommy wanted me to stay at the club after relegation back



to the Southern League, but I wanted to keep on playing at Conference North level, so I joined Tamworth, and then rejoined Tommy at Nuneaton last summer.

"I've scored goals in this league before, and I know that I can do it again. I'm sure that under Tommy and the massive fanbase we have here at Darlington, that I can kick on and score as many goals as I did before

"Tommy is a big factor in me coming to play here, I have loads of respect for him, because he helped me enjoy my football again. I played against Darlington for Telford when they were in the Conference Premier and I played against them for Tamworth last season. I know that Darlington is a big club. I know about the aspirations of Tommv and Alan White. and I want to be a part of it. It's been a stop-start few weeks though because of the postponements, it would be great to get some games in."

HARROGATE TOWN THE UNLIKELY LADS



Football historian LEIGH EDWARDS profiles ten big-name Harrogate Town players not usually associated with the club

> TONY INGHAM

Former Harrogate Town left-back Tony Ingham holds QPR's appearance record. Born locally, he impressed with Harrogate in the West Yorkshire League prior to joining Leeds United in April 1947. Unable to secure a regular first-team slot, he moved to QPR in June 1950 and was ever-present in five successive seasons. He twice represented the Third Division (South) and made a club record 514 League appearances before hanging up his boots in May 1963. Becoming QPR's first commercial manager, he had a spell as club secretary. then was a director. His outstanding service is marked by the Tony Ingham Suite at Loftus Road. He died in April 2010.

> DAVID HARVEY

One-time Harrogate Town goalkeeper David Harvey was an important figure in Leeds United's 1973-74 League Championship success. Born locally, he turned professional at Elland Road in February 1965 and provided reliable cover for Gary Sprake as Leeds were League Championship runners-up in three successive seasons. He



featured in three FA Cup finals, including their 1972 Wembley triumph. Rejoining Leeds from Vancouver Whitecaps in March 1983, he made 350 League appearances overall before joining Bradford City in February 1985. He was later Whitby Town's playermanager, then assisted Harrogate and had a variety of occupations.

> ANDY WATSON

Striker Andy Watson made over 350 League appearances after leaving Harrogate Town. He was a regular goalscorer for Harrogate in the Northern Premier League before joining Halifax Town in August 1988, moving to Swansea City in July 1990.

Featuring in their 1991 Welsh Cup final success he ioined Carlisle United in September 1991 and was leading marksman in 1991-92. He moved to Blackpool in February 1993 and was top scorer in 1993-94, then helped them qualify for the Second Division play-offs in 1995-96. Later playing for Walsall until iniury problems curtailed his career, he then coached at Halifax Town's centre of

excellence. > NEIL ASPIN

Central defender Neil Aspin was 'Player of the Year' as Harrogate Town won the Northern Premier League First Division title in 2001-02. Signing professional for Leeds United in October 1982, he helped them reach the FA Cup semi-finals and Second Division play-off final in 1986-87. He moved to Port Vale in July 1989, starring in their 1993 Autoglass Trophy final triumph and 1993-94 promotion success. Joining Darlington in July 1999. he later had a spell with Hartlepool United, becoming Harrogate's player-coach in July 2001. He managed them from December 2004 until May 2009, since managing FC Halifax Town, hometown Gateshead and Port Vale.

> NICKY MOHAN

One-time Harrogate Town central defender Nicky Mohan featured in Stoke City's 2000 Auto Windscreens Shield final triumph. Starting with hometown Middlesbrough, he helped them win promotion in 1991-92 and reunited with Brian Little at Leicester City for £330,000 in July 1994. Sold to Bradford City for £225.000 in July 1995. he had a spell with Wycombe Wanderers before linking up with Little again at Stoke in March 1999, then followed him to Hull City in July 2001. He made nearly 400 League appearances, then had spells with Gateshead, Harrogate, Spennymoor United. Thornaby, Bishop Auckland, Stokesley and Guisborough Town

> MARK ATKINS

One-time Harrogate Town midfielder Mark Atkins featured in Blackburn Rovers' 1994-95 Premier League title triumph. Starting with Scunthorpe United, he joined Blackburn in June 1988 and helped them regain topflight status under Kenny Dalglish in 1991-92. He joined Wolves for £1.000.000 in September 1995 and starred as they reached the First Division play-offs in 1996-97. Moving to York City in August 1999, he had spells with Doncaster Rovers, Hull City and Shrewsbury Town before becoming Harrogate's player-coach in June 2003. He also assisted John Reed

at Stalybridge Celtic between January 2005 and April 2007, then managed Matlock.

> LEE DUXBURY

Midfielder Lee Duxbury made nearly 600 League appearances before joining Harrogate Town, Signing professional for Bradford City in July 1988, he moved to Huddersfield Town for £250,000 in December 1994 and skippered their 1994-95 Second Division play-off final triumph. He rejoined Bradford City for £135,000 in November 1995 and was a Second Division play-off final winner again in 1995-96. Joining Oldham Athletic for £350,000 in March 1997, he was top scorer in 2000-01 and moved to Bury in June 2003. He joined Harrogate in September 2004, then Farsley Celtic and Glenavon before coaching Oldham and managing Eccleshill United.

> PAUL MUSSELWHITE

One-time Harrogate Town goalkeeper Paul Musselwhite was ever-present in Port Vale's 1993-94 promotion campaign. Initially with hometown Portsmouth. he moved via Scunthorpe United to Port Vale in July 1992. Featuring in their 1993 Autoglass Trophy final triumph, he moved to Hull City in September 2000. He was a promotion winner in 2003-04, then returned to Scunthorpe in August 2004 and was ever-present in their 2004-05 promotion success. Later with Eastleigh, he reunited with Neil Aspin at Harrogate in June 2007. making eight appearances before joining Gateshead in January 2008. He has since become a goalkeeping coach.

> NOEL WHELAN

Former England U-21 striker Noel Whelan appeared for Harrogate Town during the 2008-09 campaign. Initially with hometown Leeds United, he helped them win the FA Youth Cup in 1993 and joined Coventry City for £2,000.000 in December 1995. He remained in the top-flight after ioining Middlesbrough for £2.000.000 in August 2000 and moved to Millwall in August 2003, then had spells with Derby County. Aberdeen, Boston United, Livingston and Dunfermline before ioining Harrogate in December 2008. Later playing for Darlington. he returned to Derby as an Academy coach and has since been a match summariser for BBC Radio Leeds.

> TREVOR BENJAMIN

Former England U-21 striker Trevor Beniamin briefly played for Harrogate Town in 2009-10. He turned professional with Cambridge United in February 1997 and starred in their 1998-99 promotion success and League Cup run. Sold to Leicester City for £1,000,000 in July 2000, the Jamaica international helped regain Premier League status at the first attempt in 2002-03. He was loaned to numerous clubs before joining Hereford United in August 2007, then dropped into non-League football. Moving to Harrogate in October 2009, he netted three goals in five games including two on his debut against Northwich Victoria. He later managed Morpeth.



HOW THE OTHERS ARE DOING Chris Sykes

It's a very busy day today in the Vanarama National League North, and Chris Sykes looks at some of the games.

Blyth Spartans v Spennymoor

In something of a North East derby, two sides who've impressed following last season's promotions from the NPL, meet at Croft Park. Blyth sit in the play-off positions after a strong first half of the campaign, helped in large part by the goals of leading scorer Dan Maguire. Spartans are the division's second top scorers, but have conceded more goals than anyone in the top seven.

Spennymoor meanwhile have embedded themselves in the promotion race, although recent defeats to Learnington and Stockport have slowed down their progress. The sides will meet again on New Year's Day at Brewery Field.

North Ferriby v York

Two Yorkshire sides with very different aspirations this season meet at Grange Lane. North Ferriby remain marooned at the bottom of the table after a wretched opening five months of the season. The Villagers, who are under new ownership following local businessman Jamie Waltham's purchase of the club last month, replaced Steve Housham as manager with ex-Scarborough assistant Chris Bolder. York's boss Martin Gray, who left Darlington earlier in the campaign to replace Gary Mills, has seen his side exit the FA Trophy to Kidderminster. They remain on the coattails of the play-off places.

FC United of Manchester v Salford

In a Manchester derby, FC United will be hoping to spring a surprise against overwhelming title favourites Salford. The hosts have enjoyed six wins from 11 at home this campaign. Meanwhile runaway leaders Salford haven't lost away from home this season and will be looking to extend their lead over nearest title rivals Brackley and Harrogate Town.

Leamington v Brackley

Along with Harrogate Town, Brackley have proved to be the main challengers to the league leaders. Their away form has proven to be their Achilles' Heel, with just three victories in 10 away matches.

They travel to Leamington, who've faltered recently with three defeats in four games following a sevengame unbeaten run.

AFC Telford v Kidderminster

Mid-table AFC Telford have moved away from the relegation zone after positive form in recent months. Rob Edwards' team have the second worst home record in the division, although they have lost only one of their last five league games. Kidderminster meanwhile have become serious play-off contenders, and have lost only one of their last six away league matches.

Boston v Gainsborough

In this Lincolnshire derby, featuring two sides battling relegation, Boston will be hoping to maintain their positive form at York Street, after taking seven points from their last three games.

Gainsborough Trinity have improved their form in December, picking up three wins in a row. They also have games in hand on the sides above them.

Chorley v Southport

Chorley will head into today's game with struggling Southport full of confidence, after going unbeaten in their last nine home games. Southport meanwhile are eight without a win on the road and have dropped into relegation trouble.

Bradford Park Avenue v Curzon Ashton

Bradford Park Avenue are arguably the league's surprise package of the season, having moved into play-off contention. They have however just four home wins to their name so far, the worst record in the top 10. But Curzon Ashton will need to improve on their away form, which has seen them win just once on the road so far.

Nuneaton v Tamworth

Struggling Nuneaton host Tamworth in a Midlands derby, looking to improve on a run of home form which has seen them take only one point from their last three games. The Lambs on the other hand will be confident of three points, having lost only once in five away games.


Stockport v Alfreton

Play-off chasing Stockport have been in good form at Edgeley Park this season, losing just twice on home soil. Meanwhile, Alfreton are only three points above the relegation zone, despite being 15th in the table.

Andy Crosby has been appointed the new assistant manager at Championship club Hull City.

43 year old Crosby, who led Darlo out at Wembley for the 1996 play off final, was handed the job as assistant to Nigel Adkins, who was appointed when Leonid Slutsky was sacked.

Top priority is reducing the number of goals conceded - up to the 16th December Hull had conceded 40 goals in 22 league matches -- and Crosby said; "Obviously I hope that can be the case and the amount of goals that we have conceded is there for everybody to see," said Crosby, who played more than 700 games in a career that took in seven clubs including Brighton & Hove Albion. Oxford United and Scunthorpe United.

"As a team it hasn't been good enough. As somebody that played as a defender, I know that the finger often gets pointed at the goalkeeper and the back four as if it is only their problem - it isn't.

"We have to defend better as a team, both in open play and from set pieces. We need to have players desperate

to keep the ball out of their net, just as we have players desperate to score a goal.

"We don't seem to have had a problem scoring goals and that continued last weekend, but we can't continue with having to score two, three or four times to win a match.

"If we want to move up the table we have to reduce the amount of crosses coming into our box and the amount of shots opposition teams are having as that all contributes towards conceding fewer goals.

"We have a great working environment here and people who are desperate to do well - players and staff. The reaction of the players has been fantastic and they're open to things. They've given us some feedback as well on what they feel can help them to move forward and it has been good so far."

Graeme Armstrong has gone to South Shields in the EvoStik First Division North. Armstrong was unable to

gain a regular place in the Spennymoor first team, and he opted to drop down two divisions.

He has a promotion pedigree, having won promotion twice with ourselves and Gateshead, and once with Spennymoor.

"I'm absolutely delighted to be here at Shields," he said. "From the outside looking in, I could see how well South Shields were doing and how ambitious they are.

"When you see that, I think it's a no-brainer when you get the opportunity to come and play here. The fanbase is absolutely brilliant, with an average home gate of more than 1,500 so far this season. When the opportunity came around, it was really difficult to pass up."

Armstrong scored his first goal for the Mariners in their 5-1 win at Brighouse on 16th December.

Adam Dawson, who played two games for us on loan from Tranmere earlier in the season, has joined Southport.

Jefferson Louis, who played six games for us in the 2011-12 season, has signed for Chesham United, the 37th club of his career after leaving Banbury United. He has only played more than 50 games for a club twice in his career – at Oxford United and Wealdstone.



Michael Oliver contributed to one of Quakers' best performances of the season, and he helped put Darlington ahead when he found Glenn Naylor with an incisive diagonal pass, Naylor lifting the ball over Ryan Price for 1-0.

After a Steve Gaughan own goal, Darlington regained the lead when Oliver dribbled past two defenders and hit a low shot into the bottom corner.

Then Dorner took control. Signed two months earlier, he capped his return from injury with two goals in seven second half minutes.

First, he pounced on a mistake by full back Cec Edey to slot past Price, and then volleyed home for 4-1 when Simon Shaw ran through four defenders on the right.

Macclesfield's John Askey pulled one back in the final minute, after Dorner had left the field to loud cheers when substituted.

Simon Weatherill continues his Memory Match series with the 3-1 away win at Doncaster on 28th December 1993.

As rubbish starts to the season go, 1993/94 takes some beating. No wins in the first 13 league games and only 7 goals scored is not exactly promotion form!! Also included in that dismal run was an 11-1 aggregate hammering at the hands of Bradford City in the 1st round of the Coca Cola Cup.

Something clearly had to change, and the unpopular manager Billy McEwan paid the price. Officially he resigned, but whether he iumped iust before he was about to be pushed is a matter of conjecture. Former Pools boss Alan Murray was given the task of reviving Darlington's fortunes, and he immediately installed Eddie Kyle as his assistant. Their first game in charge was away at Scunthorpe and resulted in a 3-0 defeat. Their first home game was on the following Tuesday evening against Colchester, and no one could have predicted how that would turn out. The Quakers doubled their season's goal tally in one action-packed evening as they thumped Colchester 7-3 in front of 1299 fans, all of them hoping that Murray could lead them up the table. They managed to win their next two home games as well, but as the Christmas fixtures approached, things still looked bleak, as Darlington were second bottom in

the Division 3 table with 15 points from 19 games. The only team behind them were Northampton Town, who occupied the one and only relegation spot.

The first game of the festive programme saw the Quakers beaten 3-1 at home by Carlisle United, in front of a season's best crowd of 4.831. The following afternoon, Tuesday 28th December, they would travel to Belle Vue to take on Doncaster Rovers. Rovers were having a mixed season. Only a month previously they'd been sat in sixth place and were eyeing a promotion charge, but three defeats on the trot had dropped them into the bottom half of the table. They currently sat in 14th place with 26 points from their 19 games. The Quakers made one change to their starting eleven for the Doncaster game, Mark Sunley replacing Laurie Pearson. Sunley would play at right back in a five-man defence with skipper Steve O'Shaughnessy dropping back from midfield to play alongside Mattie Appleby and Andy Crosby in the centre of defence.

Doncaster appealed for volunteers on the morning of the game and supporters of both clubs joined together to clear snow off the pitch to allow the game to go ahead. A crowd of 2194 turned out at Belle Vue to see the game.

They saw the Quakers take the lead in the 10th minute with virtually their first attack. Mark Sunley swung in a free kick, which was touched on by Paul Cross and volleyed home by Gary Chapman at the far post.

The Quakers very nearly increased their lead in the opening minute of the second half but Lee Ellison's close-range effort was beaten away by Donny keeper Andy Beasley. The home side were now well on top and grabbed a deserved equaliser in the 58th minute, when a Williamson cross was headed home by Don Page. Rovers' momentum was interrupted two minutes later though by a floodlight failure. Only one light was left on in the whole of the ground, and that was in the press box.

The players left the field for seven minutes while the problem was fixed. and the Quakers used the break to regroup and sort themselves out. They took control after the restart and regained the lead in the 68th minute. Steve Gaughan, playing against his former club, made a good run to the edge of the box, before squaring the ball to Ellison, who fired home. Things got even better for the Quakers eight minutes later when Ellison controlled a long clearance from Darren Collier and flicked the ball into the

path of Robbie Painter, who beat Beasley with a right foot shot. Darlington had to reorganise two minutes later when keeper Collier was flattened by home centre forward Kevin Hulme and had to leave the field for stitches to a nose wound. His place was taken by 17-yearold debutant Ryan Scott. The enforced switch didn't affect the Quakers too much and they almost added a fourth as Painter fired wide from six vards out, and then the striker was unlucky not to score deep in injury time when his drive from Chapman's pass was headed off the line.

The 3-1 victory was
Darlington's first away win of
the season, but it was their
third victory in succession at
Belle Vue, which had become
a happy hunting ground,
after 1-0 wins in their two
previous visits. It also proved
to be the one and only first

team appearance that Ryan Scott ever made. Twelve minutes was the sum total of his Darlington career.

The three points lifted the Quakers to third from bottom in the table but only two wins in the next ten ensured that they never escaped the battle to avoid bottom spot. They spent much of the season in last place and with four games left they found themselves three points adrift of Northampton, but a late rally saw them win three out of the last four to leapfrog the Cobblers into 21st place. Northampton

actually escaped relegation to the Conference because Kidderminster's ground wasn't up to standard and so they were denied promotion to the Football League.

Doncaster produced a 36-page programme "The Rovers Review" priced at £1. There were two pages dedicated to the visitors, including pen pictures of the players, a team photograph and a list of previous results between the clubs. The team line-ups were on the back page.

The reserves were within seconds of achieving their best result of the season in their last game before the Wearside League Christmas break.

The lads led 2-1 against league leaders Cleator Moor Celtic until deep into stoppage time, when the visitors snatched an equaliser.

Joint manager Mark Fanning said; "We were all gutted after the game, because we had come so close to beating them. They pushed everyone forward in stoppage time, and we endured an aerial bombardment.

"We worked really hard to get in front after going an early goal down, but a little bit of inexperience cost us at the end. It's still a good point, but it could have been so much better."

After Cleator Moor took the lead after 10 minutes, Quakers levelled when Liam Marrs broke down the right and crossed for Gareth McMahon to score.

Vinny Steels had a strong penalty claim turned down and then a panicked Cleator defender hit his own bar with a clearance before Steels picked he ball up on the left, beat his full back, and beat the keeper. But then in stoppage time, a Cleator player was left unmarked to score the equaliser.

In their previous game, they came back from 2-1 down to win 5-2 against South Shields Reserves.

The lads played some great football in the second half to help them come back from 2-1 down and pick up the three points, while Dale Milburn scored two cracking goals.

Joint manager Mark Fanning said; "We were much better in the second half than we were in the first. We controlled the game more, passed the ball around better, and played some good football.

The lads went into the Christmas break seventh in the table, and looking good for a top half finish.

shares scheme, donated to the Ground Development fund and Sponsor a Seat. It was an amazing achievement to hit our target over four weeks ahead of schedule and once again a testament to our fans and members who continue to back our club so magnificently.

It's even more significant in the context of the £208,000 raised in total since April to redevelop the playing surface, boost the playing budget and to fund our new seated stand. Once the new stand is installed it will mean that Blackwell Meadows will match the ground grading required for promotion to the National League. We look forward to working with the Football Club to make the best use of these new facilities and improving the matchday experience for all our supporters.

As we hit our fundraising target for Raise the Roof earlier than forecast, the Football Club have taken the opportunity to optimise the installation timeline and associated works. The seating block is arriving in the UK in early January but it is more efficient to install the roofing structure first. So, if everything works to schedule you will see the construction of the roof structure start at the end of January (due to order time on the steel framework) and with works scheduled to take four weeks we hope that the Kidderminster home game on February 24th will see the new seated stand in use for the first time.

Sponsor a Seat

Given the firm date for construction work we plan to open up our successful Sponsor a Seat scheme to all supporters at the start of January. For a donation of £50 you can have your name plaque attached to a seat of your choice for the next three seasons. Once our new seating

block (294 seats) is installed and covered it will be a chance for those who don't currently have a seat to sponsor one of the new seats, and furthermore this will give you the right to use that seat for the remainder of the 2017/8 season in conjunction with your match / season ticket and then as a seated season ticket holder (subject to purchase) from 2018/9 onwards. If you simply want to sponsor a seat but still want to stand then that's fine too! Seats will be allocated on a first come first served basis in the new stand so act quick and bag a great view. Keep an eye on the DFC website for how to get involved.

Away Travel



REMINDER OF DARLINGTON FOOTBALL CLUB'S

GROUND REGULATIONS



n home games last season, there were incidents involving a flare, some coin throwing and fans encroaching on to the field of play. Accordingly, we have been requested to remind fans about our ground regulations.

These regrettable incidents are contrary to our ground regulations, as published on our official website on 12th October last year, and again last week.

The pertinent regulations are as follows:

"The following articles must not be brought within the Ground - knives, fireworks or any other pyrotechnics, smoke canisters, air-horns, flares, weapons, dangerous or hazardous items, laser devices, glass bottles, glass vessels, cans, poles, any articles that are prohibited by the Rules and Regulations, and any article that might be used as a weapon and/or compromise public safety. Any person in possession of such items will be refused entry to (or ejected from) the Ground."

And

"Under the Football (Offences) Act 1991 (as amended) the following are offences for which a person can be arrested by a police officer and conviction could result in a Banning Order being made under the Football Spectators Act 1989 (as amended): The list is non-exhaustive.

"The throwing of any object within the Ground without lawful authority or excuse:

"The entry onto the playing area or any adjacent area to which spectators are not generally admitted without lawful authority or excuse."

We should be very clear. Those responsible for such incidents simply do not care about our club, our reputation or the safety of our fans and we do not want them at our matches. The club will work with the stewards and police to ensure that these matters are addressed and the individuals will be banned from future matches.

Ensuring the safety of our supporters and staff is always of paramount importance to Darlington FC 1883. If such behaviour was to continue, the reality is it would only be a matter of time before serious injury is caused and the club in turn would be punished by the league and/or the FA. We will not allow safety to be compromised of the well-behaved and sensible majority by the actions of a tiny minority.

We would also like to draw attention to the possession of pyrotechnics

As a member Club participating in The National League we have been directed to take the strongest action available against anyone found in possession of a Flare. Smoke Bomb or any other such pyrotechnic article(s).

Spectators are warned that we and The National League apply a zero tolerance approach to anyone attempting to bring such article(s) into our Ground/Stadium.

Due to their chemical makeup, a Flare, Smoke Bomb and all such pyrotechnic article(s) can be highly toxic for some people. This can lead to serious health consequences for those with pre-existing medical conditions and may in certain circumstances cause lifethreatening injury or concern.

In order to protect you, the spectator, we reserve the right to search your person and/or effects and we further reserve the right to pursue legal action, civil or criminal, against any person who contravenes current legislation or our Ground/ Stadium regulations.

To further safeguard all who attend any event at this Ground/ Stadium, we welcome the receipt of any information which will assist us to deter, apprehend/detain and where appropriate prosecute, anyone in possession of; or found discharging or being a party to the discharge of, such an article(s).





Today's sponsors are related to Charlie Parias. a Darlington businessman and lifelong Darlo supporter whose grandfather George Paylor was one of the founders of Darlington FC. Charlie took the first steps to more serious involvement by becoming a member of the Vice Presidents Club, along with his son, Brian, and son-in-law Doug Peacock in 1975. An opportunity arose to take up full Director status in 1977 and Charlie was duly elected, serving until 1988 when for the best interests of the club he stepped aside to allow the election of a new Director who promised an input of funds at a time when the club were yet again on the breadline. During Charlie's time on the Board the club gained promotion, suffered relegation and very nearly went to the wall - having to be bailed out by a fighting fund organised by The Evening Despatch and backed by the fans and general population of Darlington who at the time were determined not to see the club fold. Charlie's highlights were probably (apart from the promotion years obviously) having his grandsons as mascots v Rotherham at Feethams, an FA Cup visit to Everton, and an FA Cup replay against Orient at White Hart Lane - both of which inevitably ended in heroic defeat -- and Brian Clough bringing Nottingham Forest to Feethams for a fundraiser..He always claimed to have been instrumental in the signing of Scotland International David Speedie from Barnsley.

Until his death he looked every week for the team's results, and whilst horrified at the way Darlington were kicked down the Leagues for issues that other clubs seem to constantly get away with, was always pleased to see the club climb back up the ladder towards full league status.


