

FC United of Manchester is a fan-owned club that has made great progress in the last twelve years since it was formed, starting at a low level in the national system and working its way up -- just like Quakers. Simon Hahn has been doing some research

FC UNITED OF MANCHESTER - THEIR SEASON SO FAR

After finishing in 13th place in their first season at this level in 2015/16, they are again set for a mid-table finish this time around. They struggled at the start of the season only winning two of their first 12 games. They won four out of five games during a spell in November and December which moved them away from any possible danger.

This season has been one for consolidation for FC United who have sat in between 11th and 18th since the opening weeks of the season. They recently completed a double over Kidderminster Harriers, but aside from that they have struggled against those at the top of the table. They travel to Blackwell Meadows in good form having won four and only losing two of their last eight games. Their recent good run has left them in 14th place in the league table.

THEIR LAST MATCH

FC United drew 0-0 with Bradford Park Avenue in a typical end of season match between two teams that had very little to play for.

17 year old Ryan Schofield started in goal for FC United, an emergency loan signing from Championship club Huddersfield Town. He was the busier of the two goalkeepers in the first half, but neither team had many shots on target.

In fact FC United had just one on target all game. Tomi Adeloye forced keeper Jon Worsnop into a routine save midway through the first half after good build up from Martin Wolfenden. Earlier striker Chris Sharp smashed one over the bar for Avenue and Nicky Wroe curled a decent effort wide of the post.

Into the second half and Tom Greaves had United's best chance, but he failed to make a good connection from Dale Tonge's cross.

For Bradford their best chance came following a mix up in the visitors defence. Aiden Chippendale found himself with an open goal, but tried to walk it in rather than shooting allowing a defender to get back and save the day.

In the closing minutes FC United had two final chances to snatch victory. Greaves' effort was deflected over and from that corner Luke Ashworth headed was off target in what proved to be the final action of the game.

Marginson has been an ever present at FC United after being the only ever manager at the club from June 2005 to present. As a player he played for Blackpool, Rotherham United and Macclesfield Town in the Football League along with a string of non-

league sides. His most successful spell being with Macclesfield where he won the FA Trophy at Wembley as well as winning the Conference title.

He has been in charge of over 400 games for FC United of Manchester with a win percentage of just under 50%. Marginson has led them all the way from the North West Counties League to the second level of non-league football.

Nathan Cartman.

We could have had the points in our pockets before half time if we had taken all our chances in a terrific atmosphere..

Liam Hardy put us in front when he quickly controlled a great diagonal ball by Stephen Thompson, and slotted the ball past the keeper, and Thommo made it 2-0 when Mark Beck and Liam combined well and set him up to fire right footed across the keeper.

We dominated the first half, so it came as a bit of a shock when FC United pulled a goal back before half time with a delicate long range chip by Jason Gilchrist.

In a terrific atmosphere, FC picked up the momentum in the second half and levelled

on 66 minutes with a low shot by George Thomson.

But Quakers bounced back, and Nathan Cartman sent his fellow sub Amar Purewal racing down the left. Amar pulled the ball back into the middle where the ball was cleared as far as Nathan, who hit a right foot shot that took a deflection and looped over the stranded keeper – not that we were grumbling about the stroke of good luck!

Teenage substitute Harvey Saunders scored his first ever home goal in memorable style with a late winner against Bradford PA.

Harvey had only been on the field for two minutes as a sub for Liam Marrs, when he pounced a few yards out to lash in the winner and put Quakers joint third in the table.

It was the perfect response for Quakers, who had scrambled a last minute equaliser at Gainsborough a few days previous.

Quakers nearly scored on 11 minutes when Josh Falkingham found the overlapping Josh Gillies down the left with a great ball. Gillies crossed first time into the middle where David Syers headed against the angle of post and crossbar.

But Quakers had a let off when Shane Killock fired a shot from a corner towards goal and Liam Marrs just managed to scramble the ball off the line, then Wayne Brooksby headed the follow up wide.

Quakers hit the post again on 51 minutes. This time, David Ferguson crossed deep from the left for Mark Beck, standing on the edge of the box, to volley left footed first time against the left hand post.

There was another chance for Quakers when Beck and Syers caused problems in the Bradford box and the ball dropped for sub Nathan Cartman who dragged his shot wide.

But Quakers had to be careful about the Bradford counter attack, and sub Oli Johnson created space well for himself and hit a powerful right foot shot that Bartlett pushed around the post with a flying save.

Quakers had a let off when Terry Galbraith slipped and let Nicky Wroe through, and as Bartlett came out, Wroe tried to play the ball inside instead of shooting, and Marrs intercepted and got the ball away.

Marrs was replaced soon after, with Saunders coming on, Quakers going with four up front. The tactic paid off. Stephen Thompson won the ball in midfield, put the ball into the box, and after Beck had a shot cleared off the line, Saunders fired the ball home.

Bradford piled men forward, and in one scramble, Ferguson made an excellent last ditch tackle to prevent a goal but they held on for a clean sheet and a place in the play off positions.

Following on from our request for information about trouble caused by a small number of fans at the AFC Fylde match, we would like to thank everyone who provided us with statements, videos and images of events that day. As a result, the Board of Darlington Football Club has banned two individuals from attending matches at Blackwell Meadows until further notice.

We have photographs of those two individuals and will be instructing our stewards not to allow them access to the ground. We have also provided information to the Police in order that they can consider what further formal action might be appropriate. We are working closely with Durham Constabulary who are assisting Lancashire Police with the postmatch investigation and subsequent action, and pending a decision from those two Police forces. we will not be publically disclosing the individuals' names.

We believe that we have evidence of an individual

who threw a full container of liquid at the Fylde goalkeeper, and we have asked the Police to investigate this. We have also obtained photographs of individuals who we believe were underage and consuming alcohol. These images have been passed to Police as part of our policy of sharing all relevant information with them.

In respect of incidents that occurred at the Altrincham and FCUM matches earlier this season, we can now report that two adult police cautions were issued by Police, in relation to persons entering the playing area and the area adjacent to it, and one national football banning order was issued by the courts to an individual involved in football related disorder. The persons concerned were attending fixtures claiming to be Darlington fans.

We are now working with the Darlington FC Supporters Group to determine ways that we can minimise as best we can the attendance at away matches of those intent on causing trouble.

As a fan-owned club, we will not tolerate behaviour which brings our name into disrepute, and we are committed to taking action wherever we have evidence. We will also share information with the Police so that criminal proceedings can be considered

DARLINGTON 3 TAMWORTH 2

Quakers scored one of the best goals of the season in the 3-2 home win over Tamworth at Blackwell Meadows.

We took the lead after 5 minutes, when Terry Galbraith rose high at the near post to head a long throw from Gary Brown past Tamworth keeper Dan Jezeph for his 10th goal of the season.

But Tamworth equalised with their first real chance on 13 minutes when Dan Newton picked up a long ball from Jezeph, held off Brown, and beat Adam Bartlett with a low left foot shot.

Quakers were denied by Jezeph on three occasions as they tried to regain the lead, but they went back in front on 40 minutes. Chris Hunter's deep cross from the right was cleared only as far as Stephen Thompson, who controlled the ball well on his chest, and then neatly volleyed across the keeper into the top corner from six yards out.

At the start of the second half it was nearly 3-1 when David Syers burst into the box and set up Beck, whose left shot was well saved by Jezeph.

And in Quakers next attack from the left, Gillies played a 1-2 with Syers, and Jezeph was in the right place on the line to hold on to the ball.

Quakers deservedly went 3-1 up on 53 minutes with one of their best goals of the season. Syers cleverly backheeled the ball into the path of David Ferguson who ran into the box and found Nathan Cartman, who played a 1-2 with Mark Beck before knocking the ball home.

Tamworth pulled a goal back on 66 minutes when a low corner came in from the right, and Ross Dyer, on the corner of the six yard box, flicked the ball past Bartlett.

Tamworth nearly equalised when Brandon Fox turned on the corner of the box and curled a right foot shot towards the top corner, and Bartlett just managed to fingertip the ball over the top.

Quakers nearly made it 4-2 on 73 minutes, with Thompson very unlucky not to score. He picked the ball up inside his own half, ran at the Tamworth defence to the edge of the box where he had a shot charged down – Quakers appealed for handball in vain – but he kept possession, lobbed the keeper, and the ball struck the crossbar.

Where are they now? DON BURLURAUX

Don Burluraux signed for Quakers from Middlesbrough in 1972, and stayed with us for three seasons, making 129 appearances and scoring 13 goals. He was one of the few outstanding players in the team in that period, when Quakers applied for re-election twice. He also featured in the David Frost Programme, a prime time TV show. He gives us a fascinating insight into life at Feethams at the time.

He swopped e mails with Ray Simpson.



Q. Which manager signed you for Darlo from Middlesbrough at the time?

A. Allan Jones was the Darlo manager when I signed. I arranged to meet him and George Tait (Chairman) after receiving a telegram from Allan saying the club were keen to sign me.

Q. Were you out of favour completely at the Boro?

A. I'd just got back into the Boro first team – we were playing at home against Blackpool. In the first 15 minutes I was tackled roughly by their left back who was making his debut - he'd

have been red-carded these davs but the game was different then and we didn't roll about and complain to the ref to try to get opposition players sent off! I suffered twisted ligaments in my ankle and damaged my achilles tendon. Specialists told me later it might have healed if it had broken and not damaged the ligaments so badly. I had a spell on loan at York where I scored my first league goal with a header – I was normally rubbish at heading the ball (had 'a head like a three-penny bit') but got lucky that day! York wanted to sign me but couldn't afford the fee at the time - then Boro then let me go on a 'free' at the end of the season and I signed for Darlo. I was never 100% fit again, probably no more than 75% fit at Darlo, finally having to pack it all in at just 24 years old. I wouldn't have passed the medical these days before I signed.

Q. What was your logic of signing for Darlo?

A. I had chance to go to a couple of other clubs, including Chesterfield, but signed for Darlo on my 21st birthday (8th June 1972) for less money (£30

a week plus £2 a point) because I didn't want to leave the area. At the time. I lived at North Skelton with my Mam and Dad and travelled to Darlington every day to train and play but soon got tired of that - cars and roads weren't as good then as they are now. I'd been going out with my girlfriend, Jean, for about 5 years and we decided to get married (still are, 45 years on) and go to live in Newton Aycliffe, where about 5 other Darlo players lived. The house was a brand-new council home, flat-roofed and reminded me of the then hit song 'little boxes, little boxes and they're all made out of ticky tacky'! Rent was £5 a week - the club paid £3 and we paid the other £2 - good deal! Another plus was I could travel in to Feethams every day with Steve Holbrook and share the petrol money - 'car-sharing' these days.

Q. Your first season wasn't the most memorable, that was when we lost 7-0 at Bradford City and at home to Southport.

A. I remember the 7-0 defeat at Bradford very well but for the wrong reasons – we were 4-0 down before I even got a

Q. Did you feel sorry for the

Q. Did you feel sorry for the likes of teenage keeper Phil Owers?

Phil was a nice lad and a good young keeper. He was local and keen to do well at Darlo. Yes, I felt a bit sorry for him because he was only a youngster at the time, thrown in at the deep end. None of it was his fault, he performed well in a poor team.

Q. After a while, did you wonder why you'd signed?

A. I knew why I'd signed for Darlo as I mentioned earlier – I didn't want to leave the area (not very ambitious, I know).
But I soon knew I'd made a big mistake. Aldershot offered £15,000 to sign me while I was at Darlo but for some reason the move didn't go through. Maybe they found out about my ankle injury

Q. Who were your best friends in the dressing room at the time?

A. Steve Holbrook and Geoff Barker were my best mates at Darlo, both in the dressing room and socially. Steve was even my 'best man' when I got married -Geoff also came to the wedding.

Where are they now? DON BURLURAUX

Q. You were filmed on the Frost programme -- how did you feel having a prominent celebrity like David Frost around? How did you feel when you were interviewed?

A. I still have a copy of the Frost Programme – we bought a video from London Weekend television which I've now put onto DVD. They sent a 'researcher' up to meet us a few days before David Frost was due to come and start filming the programme. The researcher asked if I would mind if they used our house in Newton Aycliffe to film an interview as there were a few of us living near each other – I agreed that would be ok.

The researcher had told us David was coming up on the Thursday evening to do his first interview so me. Steve Holbrook, Colin Sinclair, Ernie Adams and others decided to go for a couple of pints to the local workingmen's pub, the Southerne Club. for some 'Dutch courage' as we'd never been on TV before, never mind met David Frost! He was due to arrive at my house about 7pm so we'd gone to the club about 5.30pm for an hour and were enjoying a game of darts when, suddenly, the old man who sat 'on the door' came over and asked us 'are you the Darlington players?' When I replied 'Yes, why?' he asked me to go over and sign these two blokes in. will you?'. When I got to the door there was the great David Frost, himself, and a chap in a sheepskin coat (who turned out to be the director). I apologised and said we hadn't expected them so early lit was still only 6pm) and said we'd 'sup up and




go' but he said 'no problem, we've come to try a pint of this Newcastle Brown Ale everyone goes on about!' An hour and 2 or 3 brown ales later, with his and the sheepskin coat man's pockets stuffed with bottles of spirits and mixers, we all went back to our house for a 'party'! Well, that was the idea, and so he interviewed us all (plus our wives) while we were all (except the wives) 'well-away' with the booze – you can see it in my eyes in the show!

Next day, David joined in training and wasn't a bad player. I told him I'd seen him play a few years earlier for the 'Show Biz XI' (Tommy Steele was captain) in a testimonial match for Wilf Mannion at South Bank's ground. He remembered it well as he said he broke a finger that day playing in goal! On the Friday evening, he and the film crew went to the Fiesta night club at Stockton – he asked me to join them (the night before Saturday's game against Cambridge!) but I had to reluctantly decline. We drew the match 3-3 and that was the last day of the filming before we said our goodbyes and I never met him again.

Some think the programme was a 'mickey-take' but David said he only wanted to show the nation what it was like at the 92nd club in the Football League, not just at the top clubs.

What were your own personal highlights of your time at Darlo?

I suppose winning the 'Player of the Year' award was my personal highlight at Darlo because, while I was there. we didn't win many (any!) 'big' games. The local paper (I think it was the Evening Despatch?) offered the prize - after each game they asked the opposing manager who they thought was Darlo's best player. The idea was that you got £10 for each 'man of the match' award and a prize of £250 for the outright winner. I won it after getting best player 9 times that season, so would have won £340 [10 weeks wages then). However, as a squad we had already agreed to pool the money and share it out equally, so as soon as I stepped off the stage (at the Flamingo Club) the gaffer snatched the cheque off me and we all ended up with about £40 each!







Chris Sykes reviews last weekend's matches

AFC Fylde go into the Easter weekend six points clear at the top of the table, with four games to play. They fell victim to Stalybridge Celtic's late charge last weekend, losing 2-1, although Danny Rowe's strike was their 100th league goal this season.

Second placed Kidderminster also fell victim to the Stalybridge surge, losing 1-0 on Tuesday night. That result means two victories will almost certainly be enough for Fylde to win the title.

In-form FC Halifax are a point further back after taking 13 points from their last five games. They hosted leaders Fylde on Good Friday.

Salford City are fourth in the table, three points behind Halifax. Three draws and a defeat in their last five games have hampered their progress.

Darlington go into the game in fifth, with Chorley behind the Quakers on goal difference. Chorley remain in contention despite picking up just one win in their last five games.

Level on points with Darlington and Chorley are Stockport County, who've lost just once in their last 22 league games – a run stretching back to November.

Brackley Town also remain in contention for a top five place, after going unbeaten in their previous five matches, a run which has left them four points behind the top five.

Last Saturday's defeat at Blackwell Meadows all but ended Tamworth's play-off hopes. Three defeats in four have left the Lambs eight points adrift of the play-offs.

They're a point better off than Gloucester, whose defeat to Kidderminster last weekend all but ended their promotion ambitions.

After a storming run of form, Harrogate Town have started to run out of steam, picking up just one point from their last three matches.

12th-placed Curzon Ashton's season appears to be ending quietly, although they've failed to win any of their last three games.

A 1-1 draw at home to Chorley made it three straight draws for Nuneaton Town. Tommy Wright's side have long been assured of safety and sit 17 points clear of the drop.

FC United of Manchester lie 14th, below Nuneaton on goal difference, after going three games unbeaten.

Survival was mathematically assured for Boston, in Saturday's 3-0 win over AFC Telford. The Pilgrims have been beaten in just one of their last five.

Bradford Park Avenue are close to securing their National League North status, after losing only one of their last five (that defeat coming at Darlington). Park Avenue are 10 points from the relegation zone, and will have avoided the drop if they beat Tamworth on Saturday.

A point further back are 17th-placed AFC Telford. Despite losing five of their last seven, the Bucks are nine points above the relegation and look likely to be in this division next season.

They're above Alfreton Town on goal difference. Alfreton are limping towards safety, having lost their last four matches in a row.

With just one win in 21 league matches, Worcester City are firmly in relegation trouble, sitting one place and three points above the relegation zone.

Gainsborough Trinity have dropped into the bottom three after failing to win any of their last 11 league games.

Shock victories against Fylde and Kidderminster have given Stalybridge a fighting chance of survival. It's three wins in a row for Stalybridge who are five points from safety with a game in hand.

And Altrincham sit bottom of the table, having already been relegated. They've lost four in a row.





Memory Matherill Memory Match

In the latest of his Memory Match series, Simon Weatherill looks at the fundraising game against Southampton on 18th April 1982.

Another year, and another financial crisis at Darlington Football Club. This particular year was 1982, and although the Quakers had experienced many financial problems during their 99 year history, this one was so severe that it threatened the verv existence of the football club. At the club's AGM in November, record losses of £48,000 were reported from the previous season, bringing the club's total debt to £74.000. It was also reported that the club were losing over £800 per week, but chairman Leslie Moore insisted that there was no cash crisis. Things became considerably worse in December and January however, when bad weather took hold. Three consecutive home games were postponed which meant that no money was coming in through the turnstiles. The problem reached crisis point at the end of January, when a special press conference was called at Feethams and Moore announced that if £50.000 wasn't raised within the next six weeks the club

would fold. They were now

£95,000 in debt and had zero cash available to pay any of their bills. (The weekly wage bill was £4,000).

As often happens in situations like that the football community rallied round with offers of help. South Shields FC were the first club to chip in with a cheque for £100. Sunderland were next on the phone, offering to send their first team for a money raising friendly. They visited Feethams on March 2nd and a crowd of 5518 paid receipts of £5400. The attendance included the Sunderland players, who manager Alan Durban insisted pay to get in through the turnstiles!

Southampton, managed by Lawrie McMenemy, also promised to play at Feethams to raise much needed funds. The Saints were riding high in the top flight at the time. They'd spent six weeks on top of the table throughout January and February but had now dropped down to fifth place. Their team was packed with big name players and internationals such as Kevin Keegan, Alan

Ball, Mick Channon, Chris Nicholl and ex Boro star David Armstrong so would provide quite an attraction and should draw a large crowd. A magnificent gesture by McMenemy and his club.

Southampton visited Feethams on Sunday 18th April. They'd travelled north to play at Leeds on the Saturday (a 3-1 win) and stayed in the region to play at Darlington the following day. The Quakers had had a 3-0 home win over Northampton on the Saturday and so had the curious distinction of entertaining Northampton and Southampton on consecutive days.

A crowd of 9415 crammed into Feethams on what turned out to be the hottest day of the year so far. The day's entertainment started with a Women's FA Cup semi final replay that finished Cleveland Ladies 2 Southampton Ladies 1. This was followed by a free fall parachute demonstration before the Quakers and the Saints took to the field for the main event of the afternoon. The visitors



showed their First Division class early on and controlled the opening stages of the game. They took the lead on 27 minutes when a cheeky back heel by Keegan gave Dave Puckett a clear run on goal and he comfortably slotted the ball past Pat Cuff. They increased their lead on 35 minutes when a clever jinking run down the left by David Armstrong took him to the bye line from where he crossed for Mick Channon to head home. Minutes later Armstrong shaved the post as Southampton threatened to run riot. The Quakers got back into the game just before half time. From a Tony McFadden through ball, David Speedie advanced into the box, held off Nick Holmes and fired past Ivan Katalinic in the Saints goal. Half time: Darlington 1 Southampton 2.

Darlington began the second half in fine style and took complete control of the game. Peter Skipper headed wide on 47 minutes when well placed and minutes later so did Ian Hamilton. In between their efforts, in a rare attack by the visitors. Channon fired wide, before Alan Walsh hit one of his trademark screamers. just wide of the mark. The deserved equaliser came in the 51st minute when a Walsh cross into the box was met by Speedie who spectacularly volleyed home. Two minutes later and the Quakers were in front as McFadden raced through a static Saints defence and slotted past Katalinic. McFadden almost scored again but fired his shot into the side netting and at the other end Mark Wright

headed against the post as the entertainment continued. Speedie completed his hat trick in the 66th minute. Dave McLean took a quick free kick and Speedie reacted quickest to head home. A minute later he almost made it four for the afternoon but his shot hit the keeper. Ten minutes from time Mark Wright brought down Walsh in the area and referee George Courtney had no hesitation in pointing to the spot. Walsh fired home continued...

the penalty to make the final score 5-2.

Gate receipts of £9551 were the most important result of the day. The £50,000 target had been reached by the end of March but the fund raising continued. Another big pay day arrived on the last Saturday of the season when Sheffield United held their promotion party at Feethams. The Blades won 2-0 to clinch the Division 4 championship in front of a crowd of 11,130 (receipts £15000). The coffers were further boosted that summer when David Speedie was sold to Chelsea for £65,000. (Chelsea manager John Neal had been in the crowd at the Southampton game.) All of which meant that Darlington could approach the following season - their centenary on a firmer financial footing.

The club produced a souvenir edition of the programme for the Southampton game which consisted of 16 pages and cost 30p. It was printed by Printroom in Northallerton. It featured Keegan on the front cover and inside were



articles by chairman Leslie Moore, Robin Thompson of the Evening Despatch, club secretary Dave Thorne and local radio DJ Mark Page. There were five pages covering photos, history and pen pics of the Saints plus a Frank Tweddle article on past encounters with them. There were also two pages devoted to the Ladies semi final teams. The team line-

ups were on the back cover. There was also a team sheet handed out on entrance to the ground, with line-ups on the front and Billy Elliott's column on the reverse.



REMINDER OF DARLINGTON FOOTBALL CLUB'S GROUND REGULATIONS

In home games last season, there were incidents involving a flare, some coin throwing and fans encroaching on to the field of play. Accordingly, we have been requested to remind fans about our ground regulations.

These regrettable incidents are contrary to our ground regulations, as published on our official website on 12th October last year, and again last week.

The pertinent regulations are as follows:

"The following articles must not be brought within the Ground – knives, fireworks or any other pyrotechnics, smoke canisters, air-horns, flares, weapons, dangerous or hazardous items, laser devices, glass bottles, glass vessels, cans, poles, any articles that are prohibited by the Rules and Regulations, and any article that might be used as a weapon and/or compromise public safety. Any person in possession of such items will be refused entry to (or ejected from) the Ground."

And

"Under the Football (Offences) Act 1991 (as amended) the following are offences for which a person can be arrested by a police officer and conviction could result in a Banning Order being made under the Football Spectators Act 1989 (as amended): The list is non-exhaustive.

"The throwing of any object within the Ground without lawful authority or excuse;

"The entry onto the playing area or any adjacent area to which spectators are not generally admitted without lawful authority or excuse."

We should be very clear. Those responsible for such incidents simply do not care about our club, our reputation or the safety of our fans and we do not want them at our matches. The club will work with the stewards and police to ensure that these matters are addressed and the individuals will be banned from future matches.

Ensuring the safety of our supporters and staff is always of paramount importance to Darlington FC 1883. If such behaviour was to continue, the reality is it would only be a matter of time before serious injury is caused and the club in turn would be punished by the league and/or the FA. We will not allow safety to be compromised of the well-behaved and sensible majority by the actions of a tiny minority.

We would also like to draw attention to the possession of pyrotechnics

As a member Club participating in The National League we have been directed to take the strongest action available against anyone found in possession of a Flare, Smoke Bomb or any other such pyrotechnic article(s).

Spectators are warned that we and The National League apply a zero tolerance approach to anyone attempting to bring such article(s) into our Ground/Stadium.

Due to their chemical makeup, a Flare, Smoke Bomb and all such pyrotechnic article(s) can be highly toxic for some people. This can lead to serious health consequences for those with pre-existing medical conditions and may in certain circumstances cause lifethreatening injury or concern.

In order to protect you, the spectator, we reserve the right to search your person and/or effects and we further reserve the right to pursue legal action, civil or criminal, against any person who contravenes current legislation or our Ground/ Stadium regulations.

To further safeguard all who attend any event at this Ground/ Stadium, we welcome the receipt of any information which will assist us to deter, apprehend/detain and where appropriate prosecute, anyone in possession of; or found discharging or being a party to the discharge of, such an article(s).

Good afternoon and welcome to Blackwell Meadows for this afternoon's Vanarama National League North game versus a fellow fan-owned club, FC United of Manchester.

Any Quakers fan that visited FC United of Manchester's home of Broadhurst Park couldn't fail to have been impressed by their fantastic stadium. Their 4.400 capacity stadium cost £6.3M and is the UK's first new ground to be built and funded by a fan-owned football club. Covered on all sides, with standing and seating in the main stand and with a large and expansive home standing area behind the goal, FC United's purpose-built new ground shows what can be achieved when football fans with a vision work together and make things happen. FC United's members were involved at every stage during the design and construction process and the result is a stadium and community facility that is the envy of many clubs in higher leagues.

Despite being in mid-table in 14th position in National League North (before the results on 8th April), our visitors can boast of having the second highest average home League attendance of 2,585. They also have the second highest individual attendance of 4,158.

FC United is Community Benefit Society and therefore their ownership model is slightly different to ours in that Darlington FC is effectively a subsidiary of DFCSG (which is also a Community Benefits Society. FC United also boast a current membership of 3,982 – so we have a little way to go to catch-them up!

On the theme of fan-owned football clubs, every week Supporters Direct circulates a media briefing around member organisations and couple of relevant stories caught my eye and I hope you find them of interest too:

Exeter City director of football Steve Perryman on how Fan-owned clubs can succeed

Posted on the website 'www. Devonlive.com' on 4th April.

Exeter City director of football Steve Perryman has given his thoughts on how fan-owned football clubs can be successful.

Ahead of the game against Newport County, who, like City, are owned by a Supporters' Trust, Perryman spoke about how the Grecians have been able to find stability with the model.

However, he admitted that it can be difficult to be competitive at a higher level as a fan-owned club. "Exeter is owned by the fans as well so it's a derby game of Trust-owned clubs," Perryman said to the South Wales Argus.

"I've been working at this level for 14 years now and I think the fan-ownership is a good model for League Two. "Whether it works above that level remains to be seen.

"We had two years in League One because of a very good manager but the model means you have to stick to your budget and it's very important that you have a thriving youth policy as well."

Coventry City Fans Want Change of Owners and Ownership Model

Published on the Sky Blue Trust's website www.skybluetrust.co.uk on 6 April.

The 2017 annual Sky Blue Trust survey was conducted during February and has vielded some interesting and potentially worrying results. It must be stressed that the survey was done before the return of Mark Robins and the welcome success at Wemblev. The survey was completed by 720 supporters, 50% being Trust members. Of the 720, over 50% were either season ticket holders or had attended more than 5 home matches. Therefore the survey shows a good spread of supporters from a range of demographic groups so that the results are statistically significant.

The most worrying outcome from the survey is the finding that, among current season ticket holders, only 20% would definitely renew if the club, as looks sadly inevitable, were relegated to Division 2.This would mean a major cut in the club's income, a potential decrease of almost £1 million. With the current

owners steadfastly refusing to invest in the team, it makes the prospect of signing quality players and bouncing straight back up again remote. However, 60% did indicate that a change of ownership would lead to them definitely renewing, even if the club was in Division 2. The subject of ownership is one that is deep in the thoughts of most Sky Blue supporters, with 65% stating that they cared about who owned the club and 83% supporting an ownership model based around some form of supporter involvement.

To further back this supporter involvement in ownership model, 92% of respondents indicated that they would be willing to invest their own money into their club, with 36% stating they would be willing to invest £1000 or more. This shows that there is not only an appetite for this type of ownership change but that supporters could raise sufficient funds to make it a reality.


Away Travel

We had still only suffered one away league defeat on nineteen journeys as we made the longest possible trip for us in the Football League down to face Plymouth Argyle at Home Park on Easter Saturday 21 years ago. It had been a gruelling week of travel for the Quakers as we had played at Gillingham on the previous Tuesday evening. Anthony Carss came on for Gary Bannister who was rested to the bench, in an otherwise unchanged team. We were locked together on 63 points a piece with Argyle ahead on goal difference. After twenty-two minutes Robbie Painter fired us in front and this proved to be the only goal of the game giving us three crucial points and the advantage over the 'Pilgrims'. Although this gave us the double over Plymouth, as we had won 2-0 at Feethams in October, the injustice of the play off system became poignantly apparent seven weeks later when Argyle beat us at Wembley in the play off final.

The 'Trotters' were looking for revenge for the 3-0 drubbing we gave them in the corresponding game at Burnden Park the previous November and they duly took the lead through George Oghani midway through the first half. The Wanderers, prompted in midfield by the experience of Scottish international, Asa Hartford, thwarted all our attempts at levelling the score and thus ended our terrific three month unbeaten run.

We were desperately struggling to escape from the bottom four and avoid another application for re-election and could ill afford any defeats in our remaining four matches. Manager Peter Madden brought former Newcastle United and Northern Ireland International John Cowan into the starting line up as on loan Billy Coulson was out injured. Rock bottom Workington put up a dour fight with former Darlington trainee Malcolm Dawes in the heart of their defence but neither side could find a way through the other's rearguard and the game ended in stalemate. The single hard earned point was certainly more valuable to the 'Quakers' than the 'Reds' who were almost resigned to ending bottom anyway.

ATE season quiz question. Why is League Two Grimsby Town's decision to sack their manager such bad news for Non-League football? Let me try to explain.

This season has been like none I can remember for players securing lifechanging moves.

Non-League to Premier League used to be a thing of fantasy. No longer.

In years gone by it was clubs like Peterborough United providing a platform for lower level talent to play at. Nurtured by the Posh coaches, their second-to-none scouting network acted as a dream catcher.

Once a player got his chance in League One or League Two and proved themselves, they would be allowed to step up. With a Barry Fry-size profit in their back pocket, of course.

Think Dwight Gayle, or George Boyd. Peterborough and clubs like them were a footballing middle man. Now, that path is being easily sidestepped.

On Monday, another one went. Middlesborough, who had signed Shildon's free scoring midfielder Lewis Wing last month, made a move for Luke Armstrong. Having just won the Evo-Stik NPL Premier with Blyth, it was a fantastic few days for him. Especially as his dad Alun – a former Middlesbrough player himself - is the Spartans boss!

Last Friday, Premier League champions Leicester City took Stafford Rangers' Josh Gordon.

Three in the space of four weeks. That's some going.

It's mainly down to one man of course. So famous that he has a condition name after him.

The Jamie Vardy Effect means stones are no longer left unturned. Cheap, no hassle and critically, hungry. The lower level players are a punt worth taking.

Even if the success percentage is single figures, top end clubs can't put a price on finding a future superstar now they have seen it can happen for real. Literally Hollywood stuff.

Great news for everything and everyone in Non-League? Well, all except its managers it seems.

I can count on one finger the number of bosses who have been plucked from Non-League and given their chance to display their talents in the Football League in the last few seasons.

Sadly, he's just been given his P45 little over five months into the job.

Marcus Bignot left Grimsby on Monday, and as soon as it was announced you got the feeling eyes were rolling in the heads of managers everywhere.

Bignot, who arrived from Solihull Moors when Paul Hurst left for Shrewsbury, was their ambassador.

There has always been a certain stigma attached to Non-League managers much like there was with its players ten years ago.

But while chances are happily taken on footballers, coaches and managers usually have to get promoted to the Football League to get the chance to manage in it.

Bignot it seemed was the exception.

His strange sacking by Grimsby - despite sitting comfortably in mid-table and having just beaten Blackpool following the £1m sale of striker Omar Bogle - is a blow to all managers outside the EFL.
